A Word From Pastor Carl

DIFFERENCES IN ISLAM

s we seek to understand what is happening in the world around us, it may be helpful to review a little bit more about Islam.

Muslims worship Allah. Allah is the Arabic language word for god. People sometimes say that Christians and Muslims both worship "God/god." This is true and not true at the same depending on the context. Christians believe that God is one-in-three. God the Father is God. Jesus is God and the Holy Spirit is also God. Muslim strongly disagree that Jesus and the Holy Spirit are God. So in one sense, the God of the New Testament and Allah of Islam are completely different and teach different ways to reconciliation with the Almighty.

Yet Christians who speak Arabic use the name of Allah to praise the Triune God, too, because Allah is also the word for God in their language. There have been efforts in some Muslim governments over the years to prevent Arabic-speaking Christians from using the name Allah for worship because Muslims believe it should be reserved only for themselves. Other terms that we hear frequently in the media are the Sunni and Shi'a Muslims. The followers of Sunni Islam are called Sunnis and the followers of Shi'a Islam are called Shiites. The Sunni are the majority of the Islamic population numbering roughly 85% whereas the Shia number approximately 15%.

The origin for the distinction between the two groups is a disagreement about the succession of leadership after Mohammed's death. The Sunnis believe that the next man who was the legitimate successor to Mohammed was his father-in-law Abu Bakr who was not a blood relative. The Shiites believe that Mohammed's cousin Ali was the rightful heir and that the leadership should become hereditary.

There is much internal conflict between the two spheres of Islam and we have seen this play out on the world's stage. The stronghold of Shia Islam is Iran and a significant population of Iraq, too. Much of the tension in Iraq has been between these two groups. Saddam Hussein's political allies came from the Sunni tradition even though they are not majority of the population of Iraq.

Breaking it down further, there is a conservative and puritanical school of thought that originates from the Sunni tradition. This larger family is known as Salafism and a further subdivision is known as Wahabism. The Wahabis have been particularly associated with the royal family of Saudi Arabia. Salafism generally and Wahabism specifically dislikes more moderate forms of Islam and consider them heretics.

The Wahabi Saudis welcomed the Americans to defend their country and its oil against Saddam Hussein. Those Wahabis who disliked the Saudis welcoming the Americans and instead want to wage violent jihad are the radicals known with the names of ISIS, ISIL or Daesh.

As we seek to learn more about what our civilization is contending with, we pray that there may be opportunities amidst the disagreements inside of Islam for the Christ child to be revealed to them as we Christians seek to remember his Advent to us this season.

HLCW MINUTES, NOVEMBER 10, 2015

President Grace Autio opened the meeting at 10 a.m. in Hope Fellowship Hall with a prayer. Nine members were present.

The minutes of the October 13 meeting were read by the secretary and upon motion of Susan Coccie and seconded by Jan Benson approved with one modification: Grace said that the baby shower was not given by us, but by Telisha's family, and we helped with the space and the lunch. The motion passed with the change.

Jeanette Johnsen's treasurer's report showed a balance in checking of \$1,966.18, as of November 10; a savings balance of \$1,035.30 with a balance remaining after designated funds of \$1,703.70 a total of \$1,297.78. Upon motion by Carolyn Hosking, seconded by Liz Thom, the report was approved.

It was noted that we have eight pies left from the recent sale. Grace said that we will be buying apples from the Apple Hill Orchard in Bayfield again next year.

Grace reminded us that the annual fall bazaar is next week, Wednesday, November 18, the week before Thanksgiving. Everyone is reminded of their designated duties that day, and workers should be on hand well ahead of the 5 o'clock hour to set up their departments. She said that Cory Suonvieri has again made the posters that will be seen around town.

Cookie Can Sunday will be coming up. HLCW meets again December 8th, and everyone is asked to bring 4 dozen cookies for the second Sunday in December, December 13th. We will once again send cookies to Life House in Duluth.

The annual Sunday School Christmas program is also scheduled for Sunday, December 13th.

Jeanette suggested that since Hope is not able to finance missions as in the past, that HLCW use some of our extra funds to send to missions this year, at least. This will be brought up and voted upon at the December meeting, and send our contributions in January.

Carolyn told the group about a project called Peace and Love in Haiti that is being carried on by two nurses she knows at Essentia Health in Duluth. The nurses travel to Haiti every two months, camp out on the mountain sides and distribute bill caps and sunglasses to eager citizens who flock there when they are there.

She asks that everyone donate caps and sunglasses to her if they have any to spare, and she will give them to the couple to take to Haiti. Also, Carolyn's foster family member, the boxer Al Sands, plans to go to Haiti soon to help "dig a well."

The Christmas theme quilt top on display was donated by Melissa Polo, and will be finished in time for next week's bazaar and at Christmas Shopping Night November 23, to be sold at "silent auction." It was decided to ask a minimum of \$50.00 for a beginning bid. Quilt will be displayed in the Fair Building on the same frame that the Fair Quilt is displayed each year. The HLCW was not asked to babysit during Shopping Night this year.

There being no other business at this time, the meeting was adjourned at 10:45 followed by the HLCW Bible study which was conducted by Grace Autio.
